


### ANNUNCIATION OF THE THEOTOKOS

Six months after John the Forerunner's conception, the Archangel Gabriel was sent by God to Nazareth unto Mary the Virgin, who had come forth from the Temple a mature maiden. The Archangel declared: "Rejoice, thou Full of Grace, the Lord is with thee: blessed art thou among women." After some consideration, the Virgin answered in humility: "Behold the handmaid of the Lord; be it unto me according to thy word." And at this, the Holy Spirit came upon her, and the Son and Word of God was conceived past speech and understanding, and became flesh in her immaculate body.

### Greetings,

Happy Lenten season. As we begin our Lenten journey it is important to think about what it means to Greek Orthodox Christians. It means a period for reflection, repentance, and renewal. It marks our 40-day journey leading up to Pascha, where we focus on fasting, prayer, and almsgiving. The purpose of the fast is not only to practice self-discipline but also to grow closer to God, imitate Christ's sacrifice, and prepare spiritually for the resurrection. The services and hymns during this time guide us in our spiritual growth, offering an opportunity for inner transformation and reflection on faith, humility, and forgiveness. Let us all do our best to be present and engaged in the extra Lenten services.

On a different note, the parish council meeting took place on February 9th. Some topics were merely related to accounting changes and consolidating bank accounts with the Cadence fund being closed and those funds moved to Raymond James. Other topics included housekeeping, iconography, a cross for the roof, and a choir scholarship fund.

Jessica Holloway, our housekeeper, was not previously cleaning the area past the dining hall. She will now be cleaning that area every other week. Additionally, we continued to discuss iconography projects and sanctuary improvements with the ultimate goal being the consecration of our current church. As seen, we have been raising funds to cover the purchase of icons for the walls between the stained-glass windows. Fortunately, we have raised nearly (at the time of writing) all of the funds needed and the icons have all been ordered. We hope to have them in place before Holy Week. The, potential, major addition would come in the form of a Pantocrator on the ceiling and is likely the last step before consecration. We would not be building a dome, but we are in the process of obtaining quotes from contractors and iconographers and hope to have renderings and quotes this month.

An additional project underway is the purchase and installation of a gold, byzantine cross on the roof of the church. The cross is 4'x 2'and will be installed at the front of the roof directly above the faux stone. This will be an important addition.

Lastly, a Choir Scholarship Fund is in the process of being created and implemented. There are still some specifics to work out, but the general idea is that we will offer tuition assistance in exchange for choir participation for eligible candidates. These recipients will be required to attend choir practice plus Wednesday evening service and Sunday services.

The St. John Chrysostom Oratorical Festival is a nationwide ministry of the Department of Religious Education (DRE) of the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese of America. The Oratorical Festival provides a platform and experience where Greek Orthodox youth from grades 7-12 present speeches discussing the Faith and the Church. Participants can explore



and deepen their faith while honing their speech writing and public speaking skills.

This year, we will be hosting the district level competition for the Western Conference, which includes (in addition to our own parish) the churches of Baton Rouge, Biloxi, Ft. Walton Beach, Gulf Shores, Jackson, Mobile, Monroe, New Orleans, Panama City, and Pensacola.

The parish level festival will be held on April 12th, (Lazarus Saturday) after the pancake breakfast. The district level festival will be held two weeks later, on April the 26th.




# Hope and Joy


